EnvironMET

This differently-creative project involves students developing a wildflower/allotment/wildlife area within the Academy grounds. They have already planted some winter flowers, strawberries and will plant out vegetables and bulbs for spring colour.



Students will dig over the ground, plant seedlings, build hedgehog tunnels and a bug hotel - and fence in the areas. The students will also be positioning the raised planters they have made for vegetables. As many materials as possible will be re-used e.g. planters are being re-made as some were rotten. Fencing will come from pallets which Skanska are storing for us. Led by our DT Department, EnvironMet will give students some colour in the school and encourage them to think about where food comes from, the types of food they eat, how we can provide nature with homes and how they help us to continue to grow food. We also hope to create a wildlife pond and add trees to the site.

There will also be an area where students can just sit and contemplate life, the universe and everything!

The Community Development Group will be supporting with funding for wet weather gear, gloves, compost, plants and a few other items.
